

Dairy: Local & Sustainable 365 days a year

Build-Your-Own Bulletin Board Classroom Activity

About

Provide students with creative ways to learn about dairy while using the resources provided by New England Dairy. The key takeaway for students is to understand the practices of dairy farming and how they are sustainable to our environment. The goal of this bulletin board is to empower students to teach their peers about dairy and dairy farming.

Age Range

Grades 5-8

Learning Objectives

- To engage students to Honor the Harvest
- To teach students about the sustainable practices New England dairy farmers use within each state
- To provide students with information on dairy and dairy farming that they can share with family members, friends, and others

Materials and Supplies

- Large paper to cover the bulletin board
- Markers or stencils to write and outline the words to be used
- Glue sticks, tacks, staplers to be used for putting board together
- Black paper for students to turn into fun "cow spots" for the board
- Popsicle sticks and a paper cup
- Velcro for easy removal
- Markers, yarn for decorating

Instructions

- 1. Cover the bulletin board with construction paper to serve as a backdrop for the display
- 2. Use string or yarn to separate the different sections of the bulletin board.
- 3. First Column: "Honoring the Harvest"
 - a. Dairy is a sustainable food
 - b. Have students use food cut outs and diagrams to put or tack onto their plates for what is in season
 - i. New England Dairy offers a great <u>resource</u> to teach students about MyPlate

- c. <u>Food Models</u> can be downloaded and printed from National Dairy Council
- d. Provide a recipe of the month highlighting the food in season. Change monthly to keep the bulletin board fresh and interesting to students.
 - i. These recipes can be available for students to bring home and try with their families
- e. Define sustainability: "We shouldn't use up everything today that people of tomorrow will also need." <u>Sustainability</u>
 - i. This may be a new word for students. Find definitions that help students with their own perspectives on sustainability
- 4. Second Column: "Dairy in Your State"
 - a. Use the posters provided by New England Dairy that share information regarding dairy farming in your state.
 - i. Dairy Farms of NE
 - ii. CT Dairy Farm Poster
 - iii. MA Dairy Farm Poster
 - iv. NH Dairy Farm Poster
 - v. RI Dairy Farm Poster
 - vi. <u>VT Dairy Farm Poster</u>
 - i. Midwest Honor the Harvest Printable
- 5. Third Column: "Dairy Facts"
 - a. Provide an opportunity for students to learn about dairy in a quick and easy way by providing facts about dairy
 - b. Use fun shapes like "cow spots" to highlight interesting facts
 - i. Decorate these shapes with fun colors using yarn, markers, streamers, or cotton
 - ii. Put the facts on Velcro so that facts can be changed to reflect the poster for that bulletin board
 - iii. Use a cup filled with popsicle sticks for students to write their own facts or jokes about dairy on to be stuck to the wall
 - c. <u>Dairy Fun Facts</u> are available on NewEnglandDairy.com
 - d. Make the poster interactive by folding down the facts and have students flip up for the answers. This way students engage with the poster to find out their "MOO IQ."
 - i. NE Moo IQ
 - e. Have a fun fact of the day that can be switched out using Velcro or by using popsicle sticks
- 4. Use folders to provide handouts or recipes for students to take with them
















97% of US dairy farms are family-owned and operated.
